COVID UPDATE

Marin's Indoor Mask Mandate Update

With apologies to Shakespeare, to mask or not, that is the question! Effective November 1, for fully vaccinated individuals, masks are no longer required by law in indoor public spaces in Marin but are still <u>recommended</u> because wearing masks is remains a critical tool for preventing the spread of the virus! Furthermore, Marin's change to the local mask mandate doesn't change the mandate establish by the State of California, so masks are still required in many situations.

Everyone is required to wear masks in the following settings:

- Public transit
- Healthcare settings (including long-term care facilities)
- Adult and senior care facilities
- Indoors in K-12 schools, childcare, and other youth settings
- State and local correctional facilities and detention centers
- Homeless shelters, emergency shelters, and cooling centers

Masks are required for unvaccinated people and recommended for everyone in indoor public places, like:

- Retail
- Restaurants
- Theaters
- Family entertainment centers
- Meetings
- State and local government offices that serve the public

Additionally, individual businesses and organizations may decide to continue to require visitors to wear masks, and we are expected to respect those requirements.

Bottom line: At least keep a mask with you, if not on your face, whenever you go out! They are still going to be needed for some time.

Booster shots

A **Pfizer** (full dose) or **Moderna** (half dose) booster shot is recommended if you received your second dose at least **six** months ago, and you are:

- age 65 or older
- age 18+ and live in a long-term care setting
- age 18+ and have underlying medical conditions
- age 18+ and work or live in high-risk settings

A **Johnson & Johnson** booster dose is recommended if you received your first dose of the Johnson & Johnson vaccine at least **two** months ago, and you are:

• 18 or older

Safeway Pharmacies and Marin County Public Health have partnered to provide a **large-scale vaccine clinic at Northgate Mall**, located at the Center Court inside the mall during the hours below. Free rides on Marin Transit for seniors and persons with disabilities

Marin Transit is offering free rides on local fixed-route service countywide for older adults (age 65 or older) and persons with disabilities. This will be a six-month pilot starting October 1, 2021 and running through March 31, 2022. Paratransit, Catch-A-Ride, Dial-A-Ride, Connect and Muir Woods Shuttle will be exempt from the free fare offerings. This offering will be limited to Marin Transit fixed-route services and not valid on Golden Gate Transit routes.

Seniors must have a valid Medicare Card, DMV ID card/license, valid LIFA Bus Pass, or senior ID from another California transit service. Persons with disabilities must have a DMV Disabled Placard ID, RTC card, Medicare card, valid LIFA Bus Pass, or ID card for persons with disabilities from another transit service. Personal service assistants will not be eligible for free rides and will continue to pay 50% off the adult cash fare (\$1) when accompanying a person with disabilities. https://marintransit.org/farepromotions

The Last Watchman of Old Cairo, Michael David Lukas

A novel about families, religion, tradition, tolerance, and history that spans a thousand years at the storied Ibn Ezra Synagogue in Old Cairo. A blend of fact and fiction make for a lovely story of a family of Muslims who guard the synagogue from the 11th century to the current day. Starting with the original watchman, Ali, moving to the late 19th century and two British sisters who attempt to rescue sacred texts that are starting to disappear from the synagogue, and finally telling the contemporary story of Joseph, an American of Jewish and Muslim parents who are both links to the synagogue, the novel pulls you effortlessly into Egypt, Jewish-Muslim relations over time in Cairo, and how expansive the definition of family can be. *Danielle, Marin Villages staff*






The Premise, Hulu
