# Assistance with heating bills this winter

LIHEAP (Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program) is a federally funded program that helps low-income households pay for heating or cooling in their homes. It may be able to help you pay your energy bill. Qualified PG&E customers are on track to receive a record amount of LIHEAP financial assistance this year. LIHEAP funding is still available, and eligible PG&E customers who are behind on their bills are encouraged to apply today to receive the annual federal support. The average LIHEAP enrollee may receive a bill credit of nearly \$1,000 through the program, which is administered by the California Department of Community Services and Development (CSD). 

#### Goodnight, Irene, Luis Alberto Urrea

This month I will let author Kristin Hannah summarize the book. "Good Night, Irene is a beautiful, heartfelt novel that celebrates the intense power and durability of female friendship while shining a light on one of the fascinating lost women's stories of World War II. Inspired by his own family history—and his mother's heroism as a Red Cross volunteer during the war—Luis Urrea has created an indelible portrait of women's courage under extreme adversity. Powerful, uplifting, and deeply personal, Good Night, Irene is a story of survival, camaraderie, and courage on the front line." 



#### Cunk on Earth, Netflix
